#### The Cost of Cheap Grace

Jesus was no Easter Bunny. He was a hard man who sometimes spoke hard words. Especially to those who didn't want to pay the price. Because of its reluctance to live like that, Christianity appears to be at a crossroad today, but has it ever not been?

It seems the question has been, when we approach Jerusalem, will we enter, or will we turn around and acquiesce to an authoritarian regime? Do we follow Jesus into Jerusalem or do we shout, crucify him, crucify him because the crowds in Palestine thought Jesus was a character actor too? Do we follow a group of young adults, victims of acts of terrorism, the young people Jesus demands we give a drink of water, as they entered Washington DC to begin our Holy Week or does Christianity shout crucify them, crucify them? Whose side are we on? Do we believe more in personal rights or do we believe in loving others as our community and their basic needs and safety like ours? The choice seems clear but apparently, it's not. I suggest that when Jesus entered Jerusalem, on a borrowed donkey, the choice was made for us. So why the nay-sayers or rather-the okay until it comes to me or my church?

Jesus was a divisive figure some say. I suggest he became divisive only when he infringed upon people's personal lives. He only becomes divisive when he tells people they have to sacrifice some of their wants and needs so others may live. He becomes divisive for those who fear breaking away from the status quo. He becomes divisive for the church when the church thinks more of itself and what is necessary to survive instead of practicing the inclusivity of the Christ and thrive. It becomes divisive when the church caters to what benefits the church instead of opening its doors to those who need the benefits of the church.

Jesus never said it would be easy, on the contrary he said, they will persecute you. He was clear that to follow him, to take up our cross, means we won't acquiesce to the nay-sayers but walk through it no matter how painful it becomes to walk with others in their pain and suffering. That's exactly what Jesus did. That is the gospel, no matter how many proof texts Christians call upon to deny it or how much frothy emotional appeal called cheap grace we seek. The story of Christ is that he affirmed the life of everyone, especially those who were paying the price for the many. Especially those whom suffer under the regime. Especially those whom are thrown aside for the comfort of others. Especially those whom society crucifies.

The gospel is clear but are we prepared to sometimes go it alone like Jesus? To walk up that painful road to the place called the Skull? To die to our old selves so that others may receive the heart of Christ? Is the church willing to move forward up that hill to take our place on the cross so that others might live? Those others, in the gospel, were all sinners the nay-sayers said but who really were the sinners since "those others" were saved by Christ?

To become one is hard. One billion Christians are still trying to do that even though it seems like we're more intent to not do that and instead say-nay,

Help us finish Wednesday night suppers off strong for the season with your presence. As as reminder, our regular Wednesday supper program will end for the summer at the end of April.






