

"We are Disciples of Christ, a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world. As part of the one body of Christ we welcome all to the Lord's Table as God has welcomed us." My recent experience is that the last couple of months have resulted in the acceptance of a new state of things. The COVID-19 virus has, for about six months now, affected everything we do. And it seems to me that we have finally succumbed to a new standard for operating daily in the world. Wearing masks and distancing is becoming second nature behavior for us now. Trips to the grocery store where everyone is wearing a mask seem a bit more ordinary. I have now become accustomed to talking with people who have a covering over their mouth and nose.

As a result, I've noticed several things: 1) I listen more closely to what is being said since muffled words are a bit more difficult to hear, 2) I am more likely to notice the color of someone's eyes, 3) people who are wearing a mask look more normal than those who are not.

Moreover, the significant takeaway from all this is that I have learned that my own preferences are mostly the result of what I get used to. Slowly, but surely, I am acclimating myself to the changes that COVID has wrought. I adjust to change, either on purpose or unwittingly. A case in point is, there was a time, many years ago now, when a pick-up truck with four doors looked strange and out of place. These days, a truck with only two doors is the "odd duck."

I'm sure all of us have had the experience of transitioning a food or drink into our diet, with surprising results. For instance, I've heard more than one person say, "Well, years ago I drank regular soft drinks, but then I started drinking diet drinks, and now a regular soft drink is much too sweet for my taste."

I've always lived in North Carolina, and I've always rather liked the weather here. And, I have heard people say, "Well, I moved here from [Florida/Arizona/Montana] and I didn't think I would like the change in climate. But now that I have lived here for [two/three/six years], I don't think I want to go back."

Sometimes one thing is better than another. And, sometimes, what we like is based on nothing more than what we have experienced as normal. Cases in point – I drive a truck with four doors (and wouldn't think of having only two), I like my tea unsweetened (straight, no artificial sweetener), and I think the weather in North Carolina is far superior to the weather in any other place in the world. (Okay, full disclosure – I have never lived anywhere else, but I will stand by that statement anyway.)

But here is the main point – all of us are affected by the world around us, and in more ways than we imagine. What is done to us has far more impact than what is said to us. Actions speak louder than words. I think it was Henri Nouwen who said, "We don't think our way into a new kind of living. We live our way into a new kind of thinking."

This virus is going to do what it is going to do. But I don't think we should allow it to stop us from living. We may have to live differently, (e.g. staying home more, wearing masks, handwashing, distancing, bubble groups, etc.) but we don't have to stop. In fact, it may be more important than ever for us to pay attention to what the world around us is telling us. Someone smarter than me once said, "Never waste a crisis." Surely, there are some things we can learn from this one.


