"You are what you eat." I remember hearing that for the first time when I was still in school. It is an idea that has been around, as they say Christine, "for a good, long while."

As I understand it, Jean Anthelme Brillat-Savarin gave us the very first iteration of the phrase way back in 1826, in his seven-volume book The Physiology of Taste. He wrote, "Tell me what you eat and I will tell you what you are." Some years later, the German philosopher Ludwig Andreas Feurerbach, in 1863, repeated the idea in his essay Spiritualism and Materialism, saying, "A man is what he eats." Friedrich Nietzche, even waxed philosophical about the idea in his 20th century work, In Ecce Homo. But you and I are familiar with the phrase, no doubt, because of English nutritionist Victor Lindlahr. In the 1920's he wrote, "Ninety percent of the diseases known to man are caused by cheap foodstuffs. You are what you eat." Then, in 1942 he parlayed this conviction into an extremely successful book: You Are What You Eat. Moreover, I have long made the assumption that most everyone in our modern culture takes as truth the idea that what we eat determines many things about us, including not only our relative physical health, but mental and emotional well-being as well. What we eat matters. If you don't believe it, just ask Adam and Eve.

Here at FCC, we have been actively involved with food for a long time. Our kitchen, in many ways, serves as the hub of activity for our congregation. Breakfast, lunch, and dinner are prepared in our kitchen on a regular basis, as are fish stews, Wednesday Night Suppers, food for birthday parties, and meals for families who are preparing for the funeral of a loved one. We feed each other on a regular basis. And I would say the nourishment we provide and the community we build are substantial.

And we don't just eat in. We also provide take-out. We collect it and give it away on a regular basis. Over time, we have accumulated new partners and resources, and thereby have increased the amount of food we can give away, as well as the quality of the items we include in our bags. It is a good feeling to give someone food that is both delicious and nutritious. We have upgraded our efforts here, from doing something that just helps people to get by, to giving them food that lifts them up. Because what we eat matters.

I was thrilled recently to learn of the work being done by Kendall Vanderslice. a baker, writer, and public theologian. A graduate of Duke Divinity School (Master of Theological Studies), Boston University (MLA Gastronomy), and Wheaton College (BA Anthropology), she has committed her life to the study of food and community formation. Kendall is a professionally trained baker, having learned from several top American pastry chefs. In 2018, she was named a James Beard Foundation national scholar for her work bridging food and religion.

Kendall leads a project called "Edible Theology" that is based on the idea that we live in the midst of two interlocking crises: 1) a crisis of loneliness, and 2) a crisis of political and cultural polarization. At the root of both is an unmet need for belonging. On the website at, www.edibletheology.com, you can find more information about the several programs offered to help folks make connections between what and how we eat and our physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual health. I hope to introduce Kendall and one of her programs to our congregation and community very soon, because what we "eat" matters.

In the meantime, I'll be here eating my veggies, and trying not to eat too many carbs nor too much refined sugar. That has proven difficult so far this month.

OUTREACH

In March, for the first time since we started distributing the food boxes, we gave ALL of them away. 90 of them out the door, plus produce and cheese. I hope the number keeps growing.

Weekly, we're delivering 24 bags of groceries to Home Delivered Meals clients that are filled with meat, fresh produce, fresh bread and more!

We are putting together 36 hygiene kits for Church World Service. They will get delivered to Rev. David Mallory next month.

The Soup Kitchen is as busy as ever with 40-50 meals being served every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. First Christian Church is there the first Monday of every month—if you'd like to help, let us know! Katharine Griffiths is our team leader over there.

Our mission reach has led us to be active in the Farmville Food Task Force. This group is led by Frank Bradham, and born out of a series of community meetings that were held at the Episcopal Church earlier this year. The group has done some VERY impressive things already. One of the most valuable benefits has been the network that's been established. Our meetings are opportunities for sharing ideas, questions (that someone there can usually answer), and how we all get it done.

Agencies represented regularly at the meetings include: FCC, the Community Outreach Kitchen, Shepherd's Pantry, Boys & Girls Club, Youth Justice from ECU, Interfaith Clergy, Salvation & Praise church, Mt Moriah church, and the Community Garden. Accomplishments so far include a comprehensive list of all the food assistance opportunities in Farmville that's being shared through many different agencies like the VA, Community Center, Social Services – basically anyone of us who gives out food or other kinds of help. That list is also being translated into Spanish.

We've been sharing commodities with each other when someone has too much of a particular thing. We share needs for volunteers so we can help each other out.

It's an amazing collaboration, and as Morgan has said, "There's a Spirit moving through Farmville!"

Our intern, Catherine Francis has been awesome, and I'm so sad that her time with us is up. This will leave a BIG hole in our weekly operations around here. Catherine has been riding along with Tammy every week and also every month on Food Box day. Every week she helps unload the van's Food Bank haul and put it away. She's kept an eye on the Blessing Box here, too. She's helped with pamphlets, lists, signs, finding income opportunities, and more. She's been a huge help with all the balls we're juggling around here and always ready to jump in. I know she'll go on to do amazing things! We'll need everyone's help in stepping back in to do the things she's been handling. Please consider helping out on Wednesdays with the Food Bank pick-up and/or each Thursdays with delivering our grocery bags, and every 4th Wednesday for distribution and/or riding with Tammy to deliver some of the boxes. We can't do it without help!

Long-Range Planning Update April 2023

In January and February of this year, the Long-Range Planning Committee met with several focus groups to collect information to help us with our planning going forward. The focus groups did not include every active member of the church, but rather a cross-section of our membership. We plan to involve additional members in future activities, as this is an on-going process. It is our intention to keep everyone apprised of our progress as we move through this process.

During the sessions earlier this year, we asked six questions of each focus group. Those questions, and the most frequent answers are as follows:

Why did you join this church? When asked this question, the most frequent answers were, 1) because of the emphasis our church gives to inclusiveness, (meaning, because of the welcome offered to everyone, regardless of their age, gender, race, ethnicity, or sexual orientation) 2) because I am a legacy member, (meaning, my parents and/or grandparents brought me here) and 3) because a friend invited me.

What makes you stay at this church? When asked this question the most frequent answers were, 1) because of the people, 2) because of the emphasis this church places on inclusiveness, and 3) because of the mission work of this church.

What word describes the ideal church? When asked this question, the most frequent answers were, 1) inclusiveness, and 2) mission work.

What words describe what it is like to be a member here? When asked this question, the most frequent answers were, 1) supportive, and 2) inclusive.

What do you value most? When asked this question, the most frequent answers were, 1) mission work, 2) Communion, 3) music, 4) children's programming, and 5) fellowship.

What advice would you give to make us a better church? When asked this question, the most frequent answer was, 1) openness to change.

What would you look for in a new church? When asked this question, the most frequent answers were, 1) children's programming, 2) more energy, 3) mission work, 4) Communion, 5) traditional worship, and 6) fellowship.

The Long-Range Planning Committee is grateful to all those who participated in the focus groups. In the months ahead we will be gathering additional information through a survey in addition to other venues, and will share more information as it is gathered. thentic selves and learn our 2023 camp theme "Get Real: Finding Your True Self in Jesus". Find out more about camp and register at: campcaroline.org.


