Morgan's Moment

Sometimes our prayers are answered in ways we do not expect. It happened to me recently. I have been part of a Lenten study group during the weeks that led us up to Easter. In that group we read and discussed Hard & Holy Work, by Birdwhistell and Mayfield. Their book is a Lenten journey through the book of Exodus, with a view toward issues of justice, equity, and the unexpected. This is so very appropriate, since the book of Exodus is the story of how God used Shiphrah, Puah, Pharaoh, and Moses and others to liberate the Israelites from slavery in Egypt.

One objective of the authors was to make readers more aware of people and groups of people around us who are in need of liberation. In their opening chapter, they write: "This week we consider the theme of a God who sees – and not merely sees but also pays deep attention. How might we attend, as God does, to those often ignored, and then act on our new vision?"

During the second week of Lent I took a few days of vacation and traveled to the Virginia mountains to see friends and do a little trout fishing. The day we set aside for fishing was a very cold, beautiful, sunny day. When the temperature is below freezing, fish – even mountain trout – are not very active. So fishing was slow early on, but as it got nearer to the Noon hour, it began to warm up and prospects for catching a trophy trout increased. That's when my prayer was answered.

I was walking along this beautiful stream on perfectly flat ground, when I inexplicably slipped, and one foot went right out from under me and the other got caught underneath me as I fell backwards. As soon as I hit the ground, I knew I had injured my ankle severely. I learned later that day I had broken my fibula.

The next few days were much different than I had planned, and I quickly learned two things: 1) how to not do things I have always taken for granted, like standing, walking, and running, and 2) how to do things I've never had to do, like have people help me and wait on me.

Although there were other people fishing the stream, at the time of my fall no one was close by. So, I got up and began limping my way back to where we had parked the car. And it was during that part of my journey that day that the words of Birdwhistell and Mayfield came to mind, and I remember being prompted to ask myself a question: Do you think now, you can "pay attention" to those around you who are injured, either temporarily or permanently? "Yes, Lord! I hear you!"

Fly fishing for trout can be a beautiful experience. On a good day when everything goes just right – when you make the perfect cast to the perfect spot using the perfect lure – and the line goes tight and the rod bends double, it really is quite a lovely experience. However, on a not so good day, when the wind is blowing and cast-ing is difficult and trees seem to reach out and grab your lure and line and reorder it into a tangled mess, it can be frustrating, even maddening.

Well, I don't think God caused me to fall that day, nor do I think God wanted me to hurt myself. However, I do think it may have been God who used two authors I've never met, a trout stream, and an unexpected moment to whisper in my ear something important right after I fell.

In his book about fly fishing in Texas, Steve Ramirez has written about how fishing can help us incorporate the yin and yang of the human experience. He writes:

Sometimes, my casts are beautiful, graceful, like a dance that mixes air and water. Other times, I think about it too much and put too much effort into the cast. When I do this, my casts bounce back and tangle into wind knots or around the pole tip or even in a nearby tree. It is not beautiful or poetic. In any other instance, something like this would bring out my lesser nature: you know, the one that drives down the road in heavy traffic impatient with the pace of it all. I don't like that guy. When I'm on the river, wind knots and tree knots do not bother me. I remain in the moment, and I marvel at the intricacies of the tangled line around the willow tree branch. I calmly unwind it as I listen to the sounds of the river and the birds.

If only I could always be as I am when I encounter a wind knot or wrap my leader around a blade of grass. Perhaps if I relaxed and came to understand that life just happens, and we must take the time to learn from it and unwind it all with a sense of calm acceptance. Perhaps if I make myself take notice that no matter what obstructs my forward movement, it also invites me to pause, breathe, and just be – with the sights, sounds, and sensations of the moment; in this way each moment is like a lover's embrace: rare, beautiful, fleeting. 
